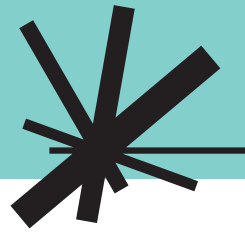

CURRENT:LA, the City's new Public Art Biennial initiative, uses contemporary art as a platform to encourage the exchange of ideas and inspire civic discourse about issues affecting Los Angeles and other global cities. Adapting the art biennial model, CURRENT:LA uses outdoor public spaces as a venue; presents site-specific, temporary art projects uniquely created for the City's residents and visitors; and provides a range of free and refreshing summertime cultural experiences across LA's diverse neighborhoods. Developed and produced by the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA) in partnership with Mayor Eric Garcetti, this inaugural presentation of the Public Art Biennial, CURRENT:LA Water, is funded by DCA and Bloomberg Philanthropies through its Public Art Challenge initiative.

Collaborators Josh Callaghan & Daveed Kapoor have created a full-scale, sculptural replica of the main mast of *San Salvador*, the flagship of navigator and explorer Juan Rodríguez Cabrillo. The original ship, though constructed in the Americas, in Acajutla, El Salvador, is acknowledged as having been the first European vessel to land on the coast of present-day California in 1542. Rising out of the landscape of the South LA Wetlands, *Mast* marks the complexities of colonialism and its layered legacies while also serving as a shade structure for visitors.

Mel Chin's new land art project begins at the Bowtie, where 'mirror makers' guide visitors through eight unique, drought-resistant sample gardens created by the artist for the site. Visitors can commit to creating a mirror of a sample garden in their own yard, and receive a blueprint for one of the eight sample gardens, the list of plants needed, and instructions on how to plant, establish, and maintain their mirror garden. There are 512 opportunities for interested visitors to commit to creating a mirror site, available on a first-come, first-serve, first-commit basis to interested visitors at Chin's Field Office. What begins at the Bowtie will live and thrive through 512 newly planted gardens in yards all over the city—reflecting a future, drought-resistant, collective landscape for LA.

A "triumphal arch" frames the entrance that cargo ships use for both the Port of LA and the Port of Long Beach, and where 40% of all goods arriving into the U.S. are unloaded. Michael Parker developed this sculpture through multiple iterations of articulation and translation with peers, and through a dialogue among digital and analog processes. Parker's project questions the new "empire of things", the complexity of power derived through technology, and the agency of production via radical-cartographic mapping methods. Dozens of small-scale clay sculptures and radically-cartographed collaborative *arch du triumph* [sic] translations are also presented as part of *The Ides* and on view during regularly scheduled tours of the Point Fermin Lighthouse.
